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## *Dear friends*

It is Christmas week again. A few years ago one December I was listening to music while driving and I almost had an accident. It was a line from a Christmas carol which was new to me and it struck me so powerfully I think I pulled the car over to the side of the road. This was the carol.

### **Mary, Did You Know?**

Mary, did you know  
That your baby boy  
Would one day walk on water?  
Mary, did you know  
That your baby boy  
Would save our sons and daughters?  
Did you know  
That your baby boy  
Has come to make you new?  
This Child that you delivered  
Will soon deliver you.

Mary, did you know

Will give sight to the blind man?  
Mary, did you know  
That your baby boy  
Would calm a storm with His hand?  
Did you know  
That your baby boy  
Has walked where angels trod?  
And when you kiss your little baby  
You've kissed the face of God?

Mary, did you know?

The blind will see  
The deaf will hear;  
The dead will live again!  
The lame will leap  
The dumb will speak  
The praises of the Lamb!

Mary, did you know  
That your baby boy  
Is the Lord of all creation?  
Mary, did you know  
That your baby boy  
Will one day rule the nations?  
Did you know  
That your baby boy  
Was heaven's perfect Lamb?  
And the sleeping Child you're holding  
Is the Great I Am!

For me it was the line "And when you kiss your little baby, you've kissed the face of God" - I tear up when I read or hear it. It so powerfully evokes how completely human and divine Jesus was in the incarnation. This poem looks at the baby in Mary's arms and anticipates his whole earthly life and significance. It inspires awe and hope.

Another NZ carol by Shirley Murray brings us back down to earth as we hold in tension the messages of hope, peace, joy and love of Christmas with the brokenness of the world we inhabit.

Star-Child, earth-Child,  
go-between of God,  
love Child, Christ Child,  
heaven's lightning rod,  
*This year, this year,  
let the day arrive  
when Christmas comes for  
everyone,  
everyone alive!*

Street child, beat child,  
no place left to go,  
hurt child, used child

Grown child, old child,  
mem'ry full of years,  
sad child, lost child,  
story told in tears,  
*This year, this year...*

Spared child, spoiled child,  
having, wanting more,

Hope-for-peace Child,  
God's stupendous sign,  
down-to-earth Child,  
Star of stars that shine,

Jesus, the star-child, the peace-child grew up embodying hope, peace, joy and love and he commissioned us - sending us out into the world to live and proclaim him and the hope, peace, joy and love he brought, so that the world might be transformed. It's still a work in progress. May you have a blessed Christmas and may the transforming Christ child touch you in a new way this season.

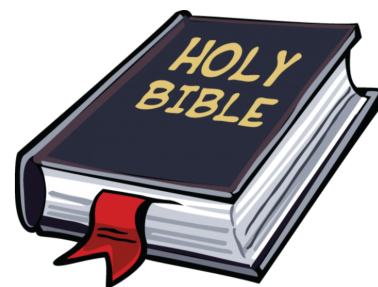
**BE SURE NOT TO MISS IT TONIGHT!!!!**

**MARK YOUR CALENDARS FOR THIS NEW EVENT!**

**The Festival of Lessons & Carols on Epiphany.** It will be sung on Sunday, 11 January, 2026. In the Christian church, our twelve-day celebration of Christmas is followed immediately by the more ancient feast of Epiphany. The early Church highlighted three manifestations (or “epiphanies”) of God in Jesus Christ at the Feast of the Epiphany: the recognition of the Christ Child by the Magi, the revealing of Jesus in the Spirit as God’s beloved child at his baptism in the Jordan, and the first of his signs at the wedding feast of Cana. As the procession enters, we recall the movement of the heavenly Word into our world to be manifested as its everlasting Light, and begin to ponder the three themes of Epiphany in Scripture, prayer and music.

It’s lovely to have Rev John Hebenton back with us today. We look forward to what he brings.



At our Eucharist bread and wine will be offered from the altar rail. **UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES IS INTINCTION (DIPPING) OF BREAD INTO WINE PERMITTED.** If this occurs, then a fresh chalice of wine has to be prepared for the remainder of the congregation.

### **SUSTAINABLE CHRISTMAS TIPS:**

#### **Christmas food and feasting**

Consciously consider the food we're serving - how to be celebratory without being polarising. Incorporate storytelling and thanksgiving as part of feasting within community to make it meaningful, and different from over-consumption, over-indulgence, over-spending and excess.

Take only what you will eat. Model this and teach this to children too! Consider plant-based feasts. Eat leftovers! Freeze leftovers! Compost food scraps.

Don't use disposable wares. Borrow if more is needed. Maybe even BYO wares.

“So a Christian Christmas – a good Christmas – ought to be a very surprising time: a time when we look at our stale pictures and thoughts about God and about humanity and let them be refreshed by the newness of what comes into the world in Bethlehem. There is another carol, not popularly sung but often included in rather high-class carol concerts, that begins with the words ‘A new work is come on hand’. A new work is come on hand, something becomes possible in our imagining of God and our imagining of humanity and of our own lives. As we sing and celebrate, the thing we ought most earnestly to pray for, this and every Christmas, is that we shan’t lose the sense of surprise. The surprise that prevents us from thinking of God as a distant autocrat, the surprise that will prevent us from thinking of human beings as a sad lost cause or else as an absolutely successful and self-sufficient enterprise. God overflows in love and has trusted humanity to reveal the depth of divine life. That’s not obvious and the surprising nature of it needs to be reaffirmed again and again.”
